Surprised Potter wins stroke play

LAKEWOOD - While the television crews and the crowds were following every movement of the final two groups in the state stroke play championship at Lakewood Country Club Friday, Matt Potter finished his round without fanfare.

Little did he know, nor did any of the spectators suspect, that he would shortly thereafter

become the 1984 state stroke champ.

After Potter finished, he looked on at the 18th green while two groups of players who had started the day ahead of him came in with their heads hanging in dejection..

Potter, a sophomore on the University of Colorado golf team, shot his third consecutive even-par 71 Friday to claim the amateur title by one shot over a group of four players. His one-over-par 285 total was one better than those of Grand Junction's Paul Nolen, Boulder's Mick Brethower, Littleton's Dave Holobaugh and Englewood's Doug Wherry.

Nolen, the leader by four strokes going into the day, claim second

The win for Potter marks the fourth time in the last five years a present or former CU player has won the stroke play.

But it was an especially gratifying victory for Potter, for it capped a week in which he had already qualified for the U.S. Amateur Championship.

"I still can't believe it," the 20-year-old from Lakewood said. "I was ecstatic after qualifying (Monday at the same course). And after the first rounds of the stroke play, I wasn't all that concerned (with winning). But I just kept playing. Walles of the design of the later. The

"I really had no inkling of winning. I thought I would have had to shoot 66 or 67 to win. I was just hoping to shoot 71 or 72 and maybe get second place. I mean, even if Nolen shot 75 or 76, he would have been OK. Only with about two holes left did I think I had any chance."

But Nolen, the PAC-10 champion at Arizona who led after both the second and third rounds, unexpectedly ballooned to an 80 Friday by shooting eight-over 44 on the back nine. For the last 25 holes of the tournament, Nolen went thirteen over par.

"The strange thing was," Nolen said, "that I

was nervous the first nine and out of bounds, but sank a fourplayed a lot better (36). But I just lost all confidence after that. I missed about every putt under five feet and when you do that, you're in bad shape."

But even with Nolen faltering, there were four other players that started out ahead of Potter and should have had a better

chance at the win.

Down the stretch, it actually looked as if Brethower, an ex-CU Buff, would claim the winner's trophy. But he bogeyed each of the last two holes to finish with 76 and in the secondplace tie. Mike Mathies, who shared second-place with Brethower after three rounds, could do no better than 83. Neither Chris Nordling (77) nor Holobaugh (74) could make a move either. Wherry, with a 70, was one of only three players with a supbar round Friday.

"I didn't think everybody would come back like that," said Potter, who was red-shirted last year at CU. "It just shows that you can never tell."

Potter attributed much of his good fortune this week at Lakewood to his knowledge of the course. He plays almost every day after working in the golf shop.

"I actually wasn't hitting the ball that great," he said. "But I know where you have to hit it. You've got to play this golf course smart.

"I finally realized that I could compete with these guys. I used to think you had to hit everything perfect to keep up, but now I know you can miss shots every now and then as long as you play smart."

Potter made two birdies and two bogeys on the day. But one of those bogeys - on the par-3 seventh hole - he was happy to escape with. He hit his first shot

foot putt with his second ball to salvage a four.

Potter said he also benefitted from not having to deal with the pressure of playing in the last group. The state of the s
